Life is short and our philosophy is that you shouldn't waste a single day of it. With that in mind, earlier in the year we asked the residents what was on their bucket list.

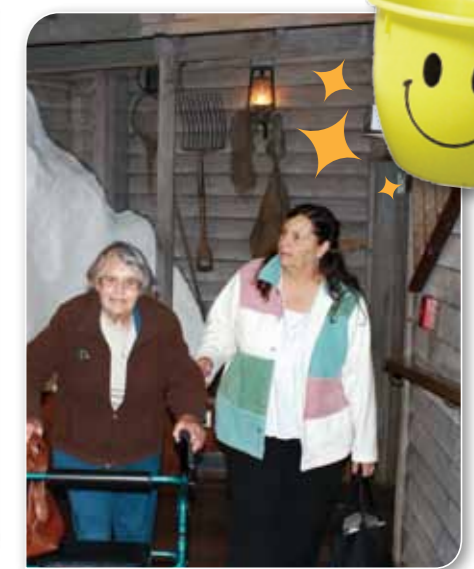
88 year old Barbara West is very widely travelled and has been to many exotic destinations across the globe but the one place she still aspired to visit was the Antarctic.
