The retirement sector continues to grow strongly and the waiting list at the Village remains full. We are delighted to see Metlifecare (Oakridge) finally getting their care facility out of the ground.

This will ease significant pressure on our very full wait list for care and for those people and their families who need extra living support.

Our OneTwoSeven Apartments are busy and thriving. We only have a few available and to help get those filled, we're offering a \$1000 cash payment on referrals that result in a settlement. Tell your friends about us!

It is election year this year and we are pleased to have members of the local parties come in to talk to our Village residents and any others who would like to join us. Contact reception for details of times etc.

Lastly, but by no means least, we were surprised and thrilled to get an award from the Prime Minister, Chris Hipkins, for outstanding work with our COVID-19 response.

His father, who belonged to the Manpower Committee, used the 'Right to Object' to keep his youngest son on the Home Guard. Thankfully all the brothers returned home safely.


We were also gifted some beautiful poppy collages made by the children of Nurture by Nature Early Childhood Care and Education Centre which were displayed throughout the facility.

STORIES FROM THE HEART

Each newsletter we'll bring you a short extract from a series of biographies on our residents. In this issue we hear about the adventures of Adele Jones.

Adele Jones and her late husband Rodney went on an epic sailing adventure that lasted six-years and saw them visit a host of exotic destinations - from Antigua to Zanzibar. It all started when Rodney told Adele he'd had a dream where he stepped out of a North Island bach onto a beach, walked across the sand to a dinghy, and then rowed out to a yacht moored nearby.

At the time the couple had a successful business in New Plymouth which they decided to transfer to their sons and set about making the dream happen. After scouring the North Island coastline, they eventually arrived in Russell, in the Bay of Islands where they found the bach of Rodney's dreams – Cavalli House, a ramshackle waterfront property, smothered in pink roses!

They spent the next two years renovating Cavalli House and learning to sail before buying a beautiful, well-equipped yacht called Aradonna. The pair earned their open-water sailing stripes in a regatta to Fiji – a lumpy voyage which saw Adele 'feeding the fish' almost continuously. The following year the same regatta took Rodney and Adele to Tonga. But instead of returning home they "turned left" towards Fiji and New Caledonia.

"Rodney said to me: 'we're not that far from Australia, let's go there! Once we got there we just kept going. Up to the top of Australia, then over the top, then towards Indonesia ... we just kept sailing west until we sailed right round the world!"

The pair took their time with their circumnavigation. They flew home every six months or so, "for significant family events; new babies, birthdays, weddings, that sort of thing."



In the early days there were several hairy moments and they spent an embarrassing amount of time grounded – once at Lautoka in Fiji where she adorned a large brain coral at low tide, and once on a sandbank in Cooktown.

On another occasion they very nearly ended up stranded on a reef in the English Channel but were warned away by locals just in the nick of time.

"One thing about sailing is that it teaches you to pack away your pride," Adele says. "You are constantly learning and re-learning – it doesn't matter how long you've been doing it, the sea and Mother Nature conspire to keep you always on your toes."

"We had only ourselves to rely on for large chunks of time. Some of the experiences we had were very, very frightening but somehow or another you just keep control of yourself; you don't fall apart, you just have to deal with it."

The voyage also taught the couple, aged 64 and 47 when they set off, that age is no barrier to identifying and reaching new horizons.

Today Adele is happily ensconced in an apartment at Kerikeri Retirement Village. Her family lives near her and they still maintain the beloved property in Russell that started it all – Cavalli House.
